IDENTITY THEFT – WHAT DO YOU DO WHEN A THIEF STEALS YOU? The U.S. Federal Trade Commission (FTC) estimates that approximately 9 million Americans' identities are stolen each year. Identity theft takes many forms, but all involve using your personal identifying information, such as your name, credit card, debit card and/or social security number, without your permission to commit fraud and other crimes. You may not even know you're a victim until contacted by a debt collector.

The consequences range from frustration to battling criminal charges. It can take months or longer to resolve the matter. In the meantime, victims may be denied loans, miss job opportunities and even be arrested.

Everyone's a target

Think it can't happen to you? Think again. If not you, then someone close to you will likely be a victim of identity theft. Thieves even use obituaries as a resource.

"Several weeks after my sister passed away, my brother-in-law checked his voice mail to hear a woman identifying herself as a representative of Circuit City. She wanted to confirm a \$900 purchase my sister had made on the Internet the night before," notes Lesli Christian, a 20-year Ashland employee who now works as a freelance writer.

"While trying to deal with his grief, my brother-in-law was forced to deal with a thief hoping to profit from his wife's death. He immediately contacted his bank and learned the charge *was* pending on his account. Knowing the woman who'd left the message might be the thief, he contacted Circuit City directly," she notes.

"Fortunately, he lost no money, but he had to close out his bank account and open a new one. We have no idea how the thief got my sister's information, but believe he or she monitors obituaries, targeting deceased individuals. The timing was just too perfect. These thieves don't have a shred of human decency."

Phishing

The increasing popularity of Internet shopping has opened a vista of opportunities for identity thieves. They go through websites, harvesting e-mail addresses and sending out bulk mailings, hoping recipients will respond to requests for personal information. They know not everyone will respond, but some will "nibble." That's why they call it "phishing."

Some thieves are good at what they do – their e-mails often look and "sound" extremely professional. Some even have a tone of authority, making you feel you'd better respond, or else.

Two popular targets of phishing are PayPal and eBay users, but there are many more. How do you protect yourself? ***Do not give personal information out via e-mail.*** If you think such a request is real, then contact the company directly. However, don't click on links in the e-mail that will supposedly take you to a website you know to be authentic. Thieves set up sites that look just like the real ones, and the URL addresses are often nearly the same.

**Note: If e-mail and/or URL addresses don't link,
just cut and paste them into your e-mail program or Internet browser.**

Ebay will not request personal information by e-mail. Furthermore, if you do get an e-mail from eBay, it will also show up in “My messages,” under an area for registered users called “My eBay.” If you receive an e-mail from eBay that doesn’t show up there, *it’s not genuine*. Forward the message along to eBay for investigation at: spoof@ebay.com.

If you – or somebody you know – are a victim of identity theft, there’s expert help available. ARTHRITIS GOT YOU DOWN? TRY GARDENING! – Whether it involves trees, shrubs and flowers or fruits and vegetables, gardening consistently makes the list of America’s favorite pastimes. A beautiful, fragrant flower garden ranks among life’s simple pleasures – and few things taste better than a home-grown meal of green beans, corn and tomatoes.

Gardening has a lesser-known, but vitally important, benefit as well. “In fact, gardening is a great activity for maintaining joint flexibility, bone density, range of motion and quality of life,” according to the Arthritis Foundation. “Researchers at the University of Arkansas found that gardening ranks as high as weight training for strengthening bones.”

Sound like fun, but the pain and stiffness of arthritis are keeping you down? The Arthritis Foundation has some tips that might help:

- As with any unaccustomed physical activity, check with your doctor to learn of potential precautions to take.
- Garden when you feel your best; do stretching and warm-up exercises beforehand.
- Plan your garden so that tasks are easier to perform. A nearby water source and tool storage area will help.
- Use long-handled tools to keep from bending or stooping. Wrapping the handles with duct tape or foam padding makes them easier to grip.
- If possible, use sprinklers versus watering cans. A hose caddy might also be helpful.
- When working close to the ground, use a stool.
- Take walkers or canes to the garden with you, to avoid tripping on uneven ground.
- Shop for low-maintenance plants and consider perennials that bloom every year. Also, ask about plants that need little or no pruning.

Volnie Hill, worked for the company 37 years.”

Jackson invites anyone in the Ashland, Ky., area on Saturday, June 2, to stop by Central Park. That’s the day the Brass Band of the Tri-State will sponsor and play at the Ashland Brass Band Festival. The event will also feature outstanding brass bands from throughout the NABBA.
